A few highlights from this year:

- Through conversations with our community partner Power Packs Project, the Community Impact Committee determined that a vital, but often overlooked, need are manual can openers. So, we “opened” our year with a “Together We Can” campaign and collected over 1,500 can openers for local families this fall.
- Our first annual Cornhole Classic was held in early September. It was a fun, family-friendly event and a successful fundraiser. Join us for our 2nd Annual Cornhole Classic on August 19, 2023!
- We enacted a historic vote to officially adopt our new Mission Statement (above), which doesn’t change what we do, but does give us a fresh way to talk about all of our important work.
- We held a successful in-person Run4Luck after a few years of holding the event virtually. The committee worked incredibly hard to overcome obstacles, including changing this year’s course to a 5K.
- We held December and April Get Togethers for the first time. Both nights provided Active and Sustaining members with time to meet in a small-group setting and discuss important League issues.

- We welcomed two fantastic new member classes.
- We packed boxes full of nutritious food at Power Packs Project, planted a community garden at the Boys & Girls Club, donated raised garden beds to Arch Street Center, handed out fresh produce at the Lancaster Recreation Commission's 8th Annual Open Streets, and held our first pop-up market.
- The 100th Anniversary celebrations kicked off with a wonderful night featuring New York Times best-selling author Patti Callahan Henry.
- We received a proclamation from Mayor Danene Sorace honoring the Junior League of Lancaster.
- We've had great attendance and engagement for our General Membership Meetings where we have focused on providing valuable training for our Provisional and Active members, hosting enlightening speakers from the local community, and cultivating opportunities for members to form lasting connections within the League.

I am so proud of all our members. Thank you for allowing me to serve as your President this year, thank you for your dedication to our mission, and cheers to nearly 100 years of serving the Lancaster Community.

# ABOUT THE JUNIOR LEAGUE

## OUR MISSION

The Junior League of Lancaster, PA, Inc. (JLL) is an organization of women committed to promoting voluntarism, developing the potential of women, and improving the community through the effective action and leadership of trained volunteers. Its purpose is exclusively educational and charitable.

## OUR HISTORY

On November 13, 1923, the Junior League of Lancaster held its first meeting at the YWCA in Lancaster City. Fifty-five young women were in attendance, and Laura Watt, temporary chairman, was elected the first president.

Today, the JLL continues the commitment that began 99 years ago — connecting and supporting women of all races, religions, and natural origins who demonstrate a commitment to voluntarism.

Our efforts support community-based partnerships that work to broaden the educational, culture, recreational, and health opportunities available to women and children within the Lancaster community.



President James Buchanan's Wheatland was acquired by the JLL in 1936 to be preserved for public education and enjoyment as a National Historic Landmark. Today, JLL Headquarters is located in the Carriage House on Wheatland grounds, all of which is maintained by LancasterHistory.

## FUND EVENTS

The Fund Development Committee is proud to report that the Junior League of Lancaster partners with organizations that align to our mission and tangible community impact.

The Fund Development Committee is proud to report that the Junior League of Lancaster had a number of successful Fund Development events throughout the 2022-2023 League year, including events with BloomBox, Iron Hill Brewery, Chipotle, and the Extraordinary Give, during which we received the noteworthy honor of receiving the most individual donors ever!

Collectively, the JLL raised \$67,664.04 through fundraising events and charitable giving. This figure includes the \$5,352.85 during the 2022 Cornhole Classic, \$9,995.89 we raised during the 2023 Extraordinary Give, and \$14,589.98 we raised during the 18th Annual Run4Luck.

In addition to the success of this year's Extraordinary Give, our BloomBox holiday sale, which occurred from November-December 2022, raised \$329.66, while our Iron Hill Fund Night Out on February 21, 2023 earned the League \$112.03. Finally, our Iron Hill Fund Night Out on April 19, 2023 bestowed the JLL a gift of \$127.15.

Unless designated by the donor, all monies raised will be earmarked and funneled to our Community Impact Committee's array of direct and educational projects and multi-faceted collaborative programming endeavors that are concentrated in our focus area of eliminating nutrition insecurity. This investment allows us to maximize the impact of our vital work to improve the health and well-being of a community we are proud to call home.





# 2022 CORNHOLE CLASSIC

## INAUGURAL CORNHOLE CLASSIC LAUNCHES

The 2022 Cornhole Classic, which was held on September 17, 2022 at Kissel Valley Farm, was a great success! The sun was shining, the airplanes hovering above from nearby Lancaster Airport were writing sweet messages in the sky, lively music was playing, the llamas from Spooky Nook Llamas were silky soft, and everyone was having an all-around good time.

Approximately 200 people attended our League fundraiser, which included a mix of current Junior League of Lancaster members, as well as outside guests from the community. In addition to attendees who enjoyed the variety of casual and family-friendly activities throughout the afternoon and evening, twenty-one teams signed up to compete in the cornhole tournament. According to 717 Rec, of whom the League partnered with to run and promote the tournament to players in the area, it was an impressive number for an inaugural event!

The declared “Boss of the Toss” winners of the Cornhole Classic were brothers Thuy and Dan Nguyen; their team name was Dilly Dilly. They came to the event for a fun game of cornhole, not realizing there would be a prize, they were ecstatic to discover what it was: an eight-person, all-inclusive dinner at Bonefish Grill! The grand prize - valued at over \$1,000 - also included a \$100 gift card to Bonefish Grill and a bottle of rosé, as well as champagne.

# RUN4LUCK

## THE 18TH ANNUAL RUN4LUCK RETURNS WITH A BANG

The Run4Luck Committee was incredibly excited to host our first in-person race since 2019! After conducting virtual races due to the pandemic and bad weather forecasts, March 11, 2023, was everything we could have hoped for and more.

We are so thankful for our golden participants, our generous sponsors, and our gracious host, Lancaster Country Day School. We tested a new 5K race course and 2-mile walk, danced with Cylo from the Lancaster Barnstormers, stretched with Orthopedic Associates of Lancaster, and our spirits soared over the rainbow.

The 2023 Run4Luck race raised \$11,450.00 in sponsorships and \$11,308.14 from registrations, netting \$14,589.93 total.

# MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

## NEW MEMBERS FIGHT AGAINST NUTRITION INSECURITY

During the 2022-2023 League year, the Junior League of Lancaster welcomed a total of 20 new members (known as Provisionals). In order to achieve Active status, each class was required to successfully plan and execute a New Member Project to support the Lancaster community and our focus area of nutrition insecurity. Guided by the Membership Development Committee and fellow League peers, the respective New Member Projects included:

- The Fall Provisional Class organized and led a campaign to collect over 1,500 can openers - known as the "Together We Can" initiative - to benefit Power Packs Project, a fellow nonprofit that provides nutritious meals over weekends to children when school breakfast and lunch programs are unavailable to them. Through their fundraising efforts, the group raised over \$3,800! This incredible display of support enabled children who are enrolled in the program, as well as their families, to access to the food they receive through the program, ensuring they have the nutrients to grow and develop properly! In addition, the Fall Provisional Class also worked with the Lancaster Library to conduct research for a future teen pantry program.

## NEW MEMBERS FIGHT AGAINST NUTRITION INSECURITY

- The Spring Provisional Class worked with the Bench Mark Program, a local 501(c)(3) flagship mentoring program that emphasizes physical fitness programming, career development, and academic coaching for at-risk youth. Surpassing their original fundraising goal, they were able to raise over \$2,400 for their "Sponsor-a-Spoon" campaign! They worked to raise the money by hosting multiple direct fundraising pop-up events at Lancaster Central Market, applying for grants, and promoting their cause on social media. The funds collected allowed them to fully outfit a new kitchen at Bench Mark Program's recently opened new facility with an assortment of essential cooking utensils and appliances. In addition, the group hosted two healthy cooking classes for the students who are involved with Bench Mark Program's afterschool youth program.

# COMMUNITY IMPACT

After a two-year inquiry and evaluation into our focus area work, the Junior League of Lancaster approved the adoption of nutrition insecurity as the new JLL focus area. This program is intended to positively impact the health and wellness of families in our community by focusing on nutrition, food security, and availability in an equitable and accessible way.

During the 2022-2023 League year, JLL volunteers embarked on a number of collaborative projects and long-term endeavors within our new focus area:

- Preparing, cooking, serving well-balanced lunches and dinners to Arch Street Center members
- Donating three raised, stained, and weatherproof garden beds to Arch Street Center that will allow current and future members with physical disabilities or traveling restrictions to plant and grow their own food on-site
- Deploying committed volunteers to organize, sort, and box non-perishable goods and nutrient-dense recipes for children and families who receive weekend meals from Power Packs Project (highlights included packing 759 individual bags of potatoes in preparation for Thanksgiving, 797 single bags of walnuts ahead of the holiday season, 383 boxes of essential groceries, and 780 bags of almonds for everyday usage)



## COMMUNITY IMPACT *Continued..*

- Collecting 1,500 manual can openers for children and their families who are enrolled in the Power Packs Project program based in Lancaster, which through our research-based discovery process we determined was a critically overlooked need for recipients (this campaign, known as “Together We Can”, was a strategically designed project between our Community Impact Committee and our Fall 2022 Provisional Class)
- Embarking on a fundraising campaign to raise over \$2,000.00 in contributions from supporters and donors to stock Bench Mark Program’s new kitchen facility with useful appliances and gadgets for members and staff to whip up healthy snacks and meals (this campaign, referred to as “Sponsor a Spoon”, was also a strategically designed project between our Community Impact Committee and our Spring 2023 Provisional Class)
- Executing a two-phase community co-op program with the Boys & Girls Club of Lancaster that entails the clean-up and planting of a community garden behind the Jack Walker Clubhouse in downtown Lancaster that will harvest locally-grown, free produce for members, employees, and nearby residents beginning in late July 2023 (through its introduction, BGC members will also be treated to experiential STEM-oriented programming opportunities, as well as educational life skills involving health and wellness)
- Improving the nutrition for the most vulnerable populations by introducing free pop-up markets that will offer immediate access to fresh fruits and vegetables

# GRANTS & AWARDS

## 2023 DEBORAH P. ALTMAN OUTSTANDING YOUTH VOLUNTEER AWARD

The 2023 Deborah P. Altman Outstanding Youth Volunteer Award was awarded by the Grants Committee to two qualified, remarkable recipients: Lauren Leister and Caleb Miller. Leister is a graduating senior from Warwick High School, while Miller is a graduating senior from Donegal High School. Both received a \$1,800 prize, of which \$300 will be donated by the Junior League of Lancaster to their selected nonprofit organizations: Four Diamonds, the philanthropy selected by Leister, and Old Line Youth Livestock Foundation, Miller's chosen charity.

Since its inception in 1984, the Junior League of Lancaster annually selects at least one winner of the Deborah P. Altman Outstanding Youth Volunteer Award. Named for the late Deborah P. Altman, a past president of the Junior League of Lancaster, this prestigious award seeks to recognize young people who demonstrate exceptional interest and involvement in voluntarism and inspire their peers to volunteer in their communities.

Since the award was established in 1984, nearly \$50,600 has been awarded to outstanding youth in Lancaster County.

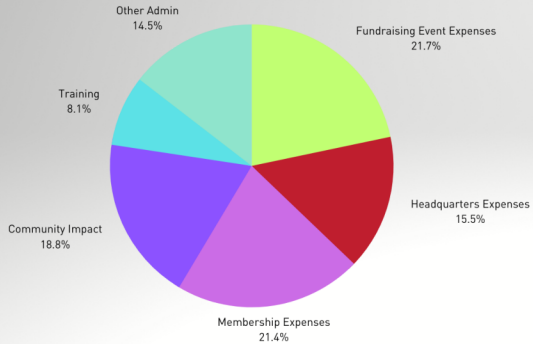

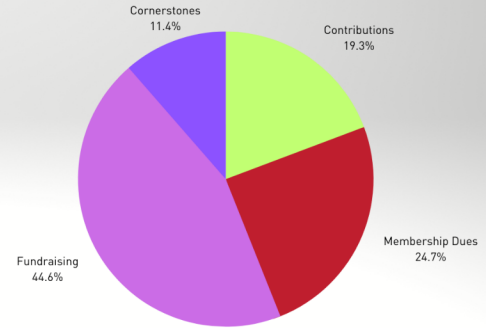
